Artist if available. "Description or title of image." Date of image. Online image. Title of larger site. Date of download. <electronic address>.

## **Citing a Graphic from a Library Subscription Service/Database (i.e. eLibrary Curriculum Edition, ProQuest Platinum, etc.) (pages 229-230 in MLA Handbook 6<sup>th</sup> ed.)**

Author's last name, first name. "Title of graphic." Title of Source. Date of Publication: page(s). Database Name. Library Name, Library Location. Date of Access <URL>.
