National Arab American Heritage Month was recognized in April 2021 by President Joe Biden, with the U.S. Department of State, some members of Congress, and 37 governors issuing proclamations supporting the month!

Arab Americans are a diverse community of immigrants and the descendants of immigrants 3.7 million strong, who have come from throughout the Arab world. The ethnic community is diverse in faith, race, sexual orientation, gender identity, and ability. - Arab American Institute







There are twenty-two Arab countries, including Algeria, Bahrain, Comoros, Djibouti, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Oman, Palestine, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Tunisia, the United Arab Emirates, and Yemen.

The Arab world includes Muslims, Christians and Jews.





Each arab country celebrates its own set of holidays, such as its independence day and other culturally significant holidays specific to that country!

Most Arab countries celebrate muslim holidays like Eid and the holy month of Ramadan. Arab Christians celebrate holidays like Christmas.





While Islam is the predominent religion in the Middle East, Arabs are religiously diverse group – significant numbers of Arab Christians in Egypt, Lebanon, Syria, Palestine, Jordan, and Iraq. Arabs make up between 15-18% of the Muslim world.








Overall 25 different dialects! Varies based on country or region.

Arab Spring



A series of uprisings, demonstrations, marches, occupations of plazas, non-violent civil resistance, acts of civil disobedience and strikes that spread across much of the arab world in the early 2010s.

The goal:

Democracy; Free elections; Economic freedom; Human rights; Employment; Regime change.



Over the past few decades, Arabs from all over the Middle East have shown increased solidarity with Palestinian people in their struggle to perserve their history, culture, and land.

Influential Arabs: Rashida Tlaib, Member of U.S. Congress


Rashida Tlaib is the daughter of Palestinian immigrants who in 2018 became one of the first two Muslim women elected to Congress.

Rashida Tlaib represents Michigan's 13th district in Congress. At the start of her first term in 2019, she became the first Palestinian American woman and one of the first two Muslim women in the U.S. House.



Influential Arabs: Ralph Nader

For the last 60 years, Arab American Ralph Nader has dedicated himself to public service. Nader was born in 1934 in Connecticut to Nathra and Rose Nader, both Lebanese immigrants.

Influential Arabs: Reem Kassis, writer, storyteller, preserver of culture and cuisine


"The food was a reminder, despite the weight of what we were witnessing, that we were still alive with plenty for which to be grateful," wrote Reem Kassis at the beginning of the COVID-19 lock down in April 2020. In this column for the Los Angeles Times, she compared the experience of cooking during a global pandemic to her time growing up in Jerusalem in the 1990s – when shelter in place orders were given during the Gulf War, and daily life often revolved around culinary comforts.







