## **English 10 Honors (Pre-AP)**

#### **Introduction to the Course**:

Honors English 10 is an intensified program that focuses on literary analysis, rhetoric, composition, and critical thinking. Instruction in Honors English 10 focuses on developing student proficiency in critical thinking, problem solving, creative thinking, and application of skills. In addition, summer reading and writing assignments are mandatory in the Honors English 10 program. Students will develop the speaking skills needed in both small-and large-group discussions; write essays of greater length and level of sophistication; do research of a more in-depth nature with a broader range of sources and an original thesis; and read and analyze a higher level of literature in terms of language, literary elements, and thematic content.

## **A Note to Parents**

Sophomore year comes with its unique set of challenges, especially because your child has chosen to take at least one more rigorous course. Because this is a pre-AP course, I expect students to handle problems that arise in my class/in their lives directly with me. If your student is dissatisfied with any part of the class, please have him/her speak with me directly. If you feel you should be involved after your child has spoken with me, the most efficient way to reach me is email. Of course, if your child is having difficulties in the course, please have him/her speak with me immediately. Communication is key: students must advocate for themselves and speak up if there are any issues.



#### Curriculum

#### Semester 1:

- Unit 1: Summer Work. This unit will assess honors summer work by asking students to hold discussion, construct short responses analyzing author's purpose, and will result in a processed paper about the summer reading texts analyzing: diction, detail, imagery, figurative language, tone, and syntax.
- Unit 2: (Short) Personal Narrative. After analyzing the importance of a writer's voice in Unit 1, students will be asked to practice their own voice skills by constructing a short (albeit rich) personal narrative describing "the world they come from." This essay will nurture and hone self-expression and provide an excellent foundation for future writing projects in particular, scholarship and college application essays.
  - Note: This unit is time permitting
- Unit 3: Prose Explication: A prose explication involves close examination, analysis, and exposition of a work of prose. An explication focuses on the underlying text structures, main ideas, language, style, content, and the interrelationships of the parts to the whole in regard to the author's purpose. Small, manageable tasks lead students through the prewriting, planning, drafting, revising, and editing/proofreading/publishing steps of the writing process, while skill lessons offer modeling and instruction on criteria within each step specific to the writing form.
  - Novel: Fahrenheit 451

#### Semester 2:

- Unit 4: Research and Argumentation. In this unit, students will consider both the positive and negative outcomes that may occur through advances in science and technology and argue what responsibility the creator and/or society has when developing a said advancement.
- Unit 5: Poetry Explication/Drama. A drama or poetry explication, much like a prose explication, involves close examination, analysis, and exposition of a work of drama or poetry. A drama or poetry explication focuses on many of the same skills in a prose explication (underlying text structures, main ideas, language, style, content, and the interrelationships of the parts to the whole in regard to the author's purpose) but also on literary and poetic elements elements such as theme, figurative language, imagery, symbolism, rhyme and meter, etc.
  - ☐ Texts: Macbeth & Selected Poems
- AVLs & Writing Workshops: These ongoing units are weekly assignments paced throughout the term. The most dominant are AVLs (Academic Language and Vocabulary) which focus on specific language skills and vocabulary (including roots) and Writing Workshops focusing on clarity, cohesion, and other revisions strategies and techniques.

**Materials:** In order to be successful in the class, certain materials are recommended. Please let me know if you have difficulty obtaining these items:

- 1. A one-subject spiral notebook Should be 8.5" X 11"
- 2. Pens and pencil/erasers
- 3. Highlighters

- 4. Post-it notes
- 5. Assigned novels if you want to take notes in the books yourself
- 6. Planner to write daily homework

## **Grades**

Grades will be calculated in PowerSchool and will reflect the **six-point scale**. Rubrics will be used to evaluate student work, and feedback will be offered to help students improve their learning before being assessed summatively. Formative work will make up 20% of the overall grade, and summative work will make up 80%.

- → Formative Assessments (Assessments for Learning) include: Quizzes, annotations, writing practice, etc).
- → Summative Assessments (Assessments of Learning) include: Exams, essay final drafts, terms exams, etc).

The semester grade will be based on a running total of the first and second quarter points and the final exam points.

#### **Grade Scale:**

## **Extra Credit**

No extra credit will be accepted. Students are expected to do the reading and writing assignments as designed for the course.

## **Asynchronous Work**

Most often, daily homework is assigned to prepare for the next day's lesson. If a student does not do the homework, you will not be able to participate fully. Students will receive at least two days notice on major tests. Quizzes will be given at any time, without advance notice. No extra credit is offered or given—the way to excel in this class is to do all of the work assigned, and in doing so, learn the material in a profound way.

## Late Work & Make-Up Work

With pre-approval, essays and electronic assignments may be turned in up to two days late. Communication is key here—if you are not turning something in, speak to me immediately after class. The EXCEPTION to this rule: ROUGH DRAFTS of ESSAYS will not be accepted late. They are due in class on the due date. Conversational blogs are also due on the posted dates...BOTH of these assignments require peer participation, so late work is not possible for points.

# **Citizenship Grade**

The <u>citizenship grade</u> is measured by your ability and willingness to follow the policies of this class. As an English Department, we value courtesy, cooperation, and respect.
