Sutter Middle School Social Science 6 Class Syllabus

Course Description:

Students in sixth-grade world history and geography classrooms learn about the earliest humans, the development of tools, the foraging way of life, agriculture, and the emergence of civilizations in Mesopotamia, Egypt, ancient Israel, the Indus River valley, China, Mesoamerica, and the Mediterranean basin.

Although teachers should keep the focus on ancient events and problems, this course gives students the opportunity to grapple with geography, environmental issues, political systems and power structures, and civic engagement with fundamental ideas about citizenship, freedom, morality, and law, which also exist in the modern world. Students practice history as an interpretive discipline. They read written primary sources and secondary sources, investigate visual primary sources, and learn how to analyze multiple points of view, cite evidence from sources, and make claims in writing and speaking based on that evidence.

Students will be exposed to current events and could compare and contrast events which occurred in the past to events occurring currently. Materials, lesson plans and formative and summative assessments used could change depending on the needs of current students. All materials used in the course will be grade level and age appropriate and relative to the State of CA HSS content standards and framework for grade 6 students.

Classroom Norms, Procedures, & Standards:

Beginning Class

Behavior Standards

- Expectations- Don't cause a problem. If you do, fix it. If you don't, I will. You will like your solution better than mine. What is considered a problem? Anything that disrupts other students from learning or the teacher from teaching.
- <u>Hall passes</u>- Request pass from teacher. No passes first and last 5 minutes of class.
- Food and Drink- Water ONLY in a sealed container. Absolutely NO FOOD in class. Gum is NEVER allowed.
- <u>Electronics and Chromebooks</u>- According to district policy, all cell phones must be enclosed in a provided Yondr pouch, and other electronics must be out of sight and OFF at all times. If you need to use the phone to call home, just ask. Chromebooks are only to be used for on-topic class assignments. GoGuardian is used to monitor student screen time
- Absences- Check Google Classroom or white board to see what you missed when absent. It is your responsibility to
 make up any assignments or notes missed. If absent for a test, you have to make up the test as soon as possible. Per
 district policy, students receive two days to complete work for each day absent.
- <u>Late Work and Retake Policy</u>- All late work is due one week from the due date. Work turned in after one week will
 not receive credit. Students who have completed all unit assignments can retake summative assessments (end of
 unit test or project). Schedule retake with teacher.
